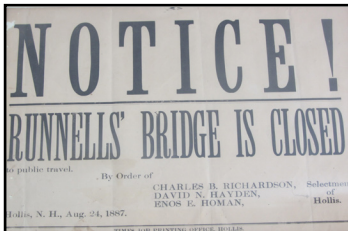
So, what has been going on at the Hollis Historical Society? Things are alive, well, and bustling. Let me fill you in:

EXHIBITS:

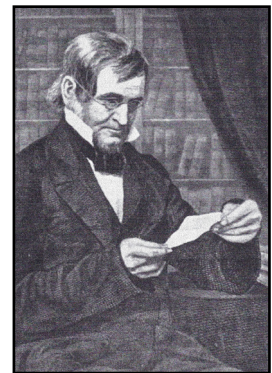


- We have a new wall display upstairs in the hall at the Wheeler House. It's a combination of photos, artifacts and artwork, put together and displayed by Martha Davis and Joe Harlin. Great job!



- More artifacts have been added to the newly refurbished dining room at 20 Main Street, including Runnells Bridge items. Two members paid to have a painting of Runnells Bridge re-matted and covered with conservation glass. A friend from Nashua, Mr. Mooney, gave us a 'Runnells Bridge Closed' notice dated 1887. Two more pictures of Runnells Bridge have been put on display and there's no telling what else may turn up! Please come see it. Runnells Bridge played a huge part in the lives of Hollis residents....and when you think about it, still does.

• **A Collection of Joseph Emerson Worcester Artifacts:** Joseph E. Worcester, of DICTIONARY WARS fame and our April program topic (April 18th @7:30 PM at the Lawrence Barn) will have a presence during a display at the Wheeler House, thanks to Worcester descendants, brothers Tom and Charles Worcester, and cousin Fredricka Olson. You'll even see a few items by that other dictionary guy....I think his name was Webster. Plus, there will be letters to Worcester, complimenting him on his dictionary, from CHARLES DICKENS, THACKERY, and COLERIDGE which are owned by your own HHS. These will be on display at the Wheeler House for a couple of weeks after April 18th. Don't miss it!



- See a comprehensive collection of children's clothing and toys this summer at the Wheeler house, which will be compiled by Martha Davis, Phyllis Houle, and Sharon Howe.

- If you like TOOLS, you're going to love the exhibit that Martha Davis is cooking up for you at the Always Ready Engine House this summer. I wonder if you can guess what some of them were used for? MEMBERSHIP DRIVE:

Marilyn Wehrle, Sue Birch, and myself have been working on a mailing to increase our membership. As of this writing, we have 41 NEW members. We are so pleased to welcome all these new folks into our Society and THANK YOU! And THANK YOU also to all our regular members for your continued support! Without you, we wouldn't exist. In this newsletter, we'll print a list of all our members. It's fun to know neighbors who share our common interests.

NEW HAPPENINGS:

- The Hollis Brookline Rotary Club has asked the Hollis Historical Society to join forces with them to help present an ANNUAL NOAH WORCESTER PEACE MEMORIAL PROGRAM. The 2012-2013 Presidential theme of Rotary International is "Peace through Service." Per Peter Webb of the Hollis-Brookline Rotary Club, "In the case of our two communities....one of our native sons, Noah Worcester, is known to history as the 'Apostle of Peace' and a pioneer in the American Peace Movement." Webb continues that, "...in 1758, eleven years before Brookline would be created out of a portion of the west side of Hollis, Noah Worcester was born. His ancestral home is part of a house which stands today at the corner of Depot and Richardson Roads in Hollis. An unusually strong and large young man, Worcester's energies were devoted to the demanding physical work required to sustain a family at that time. As a result, his formal schooling was only seasonal and ended once and for all when he was 15.

In 1775, when Noah was 16, he was present at the Battle of Bunker Hill, and at 18, was at the Battle of Bennington. Worcester recalled that the most difficult part of the battles was what he saw on the field afterwards. Despite his limited formal education, Worcester had an unusual capacity for rigorous thought, as well as an independence of opinion and a compulsion to express himself in writing. He was a devout Christian, but his opinions were somewhat controversial. One noteworthy opinion which Noah Worcester formed from his careful study of the Bible was that war was fundamentally antithetical to the principles of his religion. Worcester made his public argument against war in a short treatise entitled 'A Solemn Review of the Custom of War,' published in 1814 under the pseudonym 'Philo Pacificus.' The text, which has been called an 'epic-making classic in the history of peace literature,' was widely read in the United States and was translated into several languages in Europe. For 13 years, Worcester edited and wrote for a Boston journal, 'The Friends of Peace.' Worcester died in 1837, and in a eulogy for Noah Worcester, William Ellery Channing wrote that 'to spread peace on earth became the object of his life.' Attorney Webb noted, "both Brookline and Hollis, like other towns, have war memorials. Neither town, as is also the case in other towns, has a commemoration of any kind dedicated to peace, a cause which would probably be especially dear to those whose names figure most prominently on the war monuments. While we periodically espouse the cause of peace, we don't honor it as we do war."



Hence, the FIRST ANNUAL NOAH WORCESTER PEACE MEMORIAL PROGRAM will be held Wednesday, May 22nd, 2013, at 7 PM, at the Lawrence Barn in Hollis. And one of our HHS members, and descendant of Noah Worcester, will give a brief presentation on Noah Worcester. Charles Worcester will represent our Society during this exciting joint venture between the Hollis Brookline Rotary Club and the Hollis Historical Society. Folks in the audience will then hear from noted guest speaker, Dr. Donna Hicks of Harvard University, creator of the dignity approach to conflict resolution. Dr. Hicks is the author of the new book, "Dignity." Hicks shows that by choosing dignity as a way of life, we open the way to greater peace within ourselves and to a safer and more humane world for all. Please attend this enlightening program and help support this first joint effort between the HHS and the Hollis-Brookline Rotary Club.

- We've started having a "WHAT IS IT?" table of vintage items at our program meetings. Folks are invited to bring in an item or items that they DON'T KNOW WHAT IT IS. Or maybe you know what an item is, but don't think other folks will know its use or purpose. Even old photos of Hollis folks make a fun guessing game. So look around your house, your attic, your barn....and bring in those "What Is It?" articles to our program meetings. It's great entertainment!

She is a whiz at the process of accessioning (trust me, it's a thought provoking and often times a laborious process) and she's a great teacher to me. For which I thank her immensely. In addition to accessioning new acquisitions, we have also accessioned hundreds of FIC (found in collection) artifacts. Accessioning an item takes a lot of time and involves a great deal of paperwork and often research work as well. Also helping is Bob Cushman, who comes to the Wheeler House on a regular basis and enters all our accession worksheet information into the computer, which is no small task. When time permits Martha Davis and Phyllis Houle also lend a hand listing items in our collection. Thank you all for your dedication and hard work.
- Joe Harlin refinished the frame on our portrait of Arthur Gilman, author of "My Cranford," a book about Hollis, complete with photographs, published in 1909. Joe also put new backing and new glass on the portrait. It looks fabulous!! Thank you, Joe!

You've got to read it! Old Tusky is my hero! And Narragansett, the horse, is terrific too! Just \$10. and it benefits the Hollis Social Library.
